You want suspense? Read the "Dragonslayer" storyline in Jeff Smith's "Bone". You want slice of life? Read Martin Wagner's "Hepcats". I'd recommend it to anyone who knows someone who's struggling with an incident of child abuse or is running from their past. I get misty-eyed every time I read the scene in Issue no. 10 where Erica's friends rescue her from a suicide attempt. Brilliantly rendered, and powerful. When life seems futile, I read Bob Rozakis's "'Mazing Man". The gentle story of a "loony" who gains the respect of the people around him helps me remember what's truly important in life.

Anyhow, I better wrap this up, 'cuz I've got a lot of home-work. So the next time you want to expand your awareness of the world around you, please.... read a comic book.


DOWN THAT MACHETE! NO!!!!!!")



plains "They always draw my beak wrong."

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





